Vickie Haley, Interim Administrator/City Finance Officer, gave a Report on Debt on the General Obligation Bonds, Series 2023. She reported that, on November 16, 2023, the city issued general obligation bonds series 2023 through a competitive bid to fund a portion of the FY23 and 24 Capital program. The face amount of the bonds is \$41,995,000.00. The bonds were issued at a premium with a true interest cost of 4.203602-percent. These are 20-year bonds with final maturity October 1, 2024. It did include \$261,852.00 for issue costs, which cover things like the rating agency, bond counsel, disclosure counsel, financial advisory services, underwriting, printing, etc. Discussion ensued, with Councilman Ledford commenting on lower interest rates in the past. There were no further questions or comments on the report. There was no action required from the Council for this report.
