# CALL TO ORDER

Vice-Chairman Ken Smith called the meeting to order with a quorum present, including Council members Carol Berz, Anthony Byrd, Demetrus Coonrod, Russell Gilbert, Chip Henderson, Darrin Ledford and Erskine Oglesby. Wade Hinton, City Attorney, and Nicole Gwyn, Council Clerk, CMC, were also present. Council Chairman Jerry Mitchell was not present.

# PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Councilman Ledford led the Assembly in the Pledge of Allegiance and read a prayer for the invocation.

#### ORDINANCE #13193

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHATTANOOGA CITY CODE, PART II, CHAPTER 38, ZONING ORDINANCE, SO AS TO REZONE PROPERTY LOCATED AT 4817 ADAMS ROAD, MORE PARTICULARLY DESCRIBED HEREIN, FROM M-2 LIGHT INDUSTRIAL ZONE TO M-1 MANUFACTURING ZONE.

Vice-Chairman Smith instructed the Clerk to read the Alternate Version of this item. The Applicant was present, but no Opposition present in the Assembly. **Councilman Ledford moved** to approve, seconded by Councilman Henderson. John Bridger, Executive

Director of the Regional Planning Agency, recommended amending to add a condition. **Councilman Ledford moved to reconsider, seconded by Councilman Henderson. Councilman Henderson moved** to amend to "*limit the use to recreational vehicles sales only.*" He was seconded by Councilman Ledford. The motion carried. **Councilwoman Berz moved** to approve as amended, seconded by Councilman Ledford. The motion carried.

# ACTION: PASSED ON FIRST READING; AS AMENDED

A hearing ensued on the following:

#### ORDINANCE #13194

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHATTANOOGA CITY CODE, PART II, CHAPTER 38, ZONING ORDINANCE, AND CHAPTER 11, BUSINESSES, TRADES, AND OCCUPATIONS, RELATING TO SHORT-TERM VACATION RENTALS WITHIN ANY ZONES ALLOWING RESIDENTIAL USE AND PROVIDING TERMS AND CONDITIONS FOR THE ISSUANCE OF SHORT-TERM VACATION RENTAL CERTIFICATES.

Mr. Bridger discussed the draft in which the Council would be considering and confirmed for Councilwoman Berz that this was the draft from two weeks ago that included the original urban overlay and Lookout Valley. He also confirmed for Councilman Gilbert that the present draft excluded all of District 5.

Vice-Chairman Smith informed the Assembly that the Council held a public hearing earlier today at 3:00 p.m. to hear from constituents for and against this ordinance. This meeting, he allotted nine minutes total for individuals for and against the ordinance to address the Council. After Attorney Hinton read the rules for addressing the Council, Vice-Chairman Smith made a point of clarification and stated his intent to allow 9 minutes for those in favor of the ordinance and 9 minutes for those in opposition to the ordinance. He also ruled to allow individuals who spoke at the public hearing earlier today to speak once all other new speakers had addressed the Council on this specific agenda item.

Speakers In Favor of the Ordinance:

- **Bill Lockheart (District 7)** He favors regulation of STVR and believes the STVR boundary is fair. He and his wife have hosted several guests who have relocated to Chattanooga after their stay.
- Blake Bozarth (District 9) He encourages passage of the ordinance because he and his wife are Airbnb hosts in Highland Park. He believes that STVR properties are better maintained than most other rental units and are a good way to promote a community. He believes there is unfounded fear about STVR, but says those fears are not unique to Airbnb.
- Lexi Bozarth (District 9) As an Airbnb host, she has hosted over 200 guests in her previous home. She shared how impactful being a host is for economic security. She loves showing off her community and noted that several of her guests have relocated to Chattanooga.

• Farren Gilbert (District 2) – She is an Airbnb host and the president of her neighborhood association. She operates an owner-occupied STVR near GPS. She discussed the communication and comradery between hosts throughout the community and discussed holding other hosts responsible for their actions.

Speakers in Opposition to the Ordinance:

- **David Tullis (Chattanooga)** He opposes the STVR overlay because, he feels, the boundaries are "arbitrary and capricious." He feels that the STVR overlay is unfair because it limits a free market with its boundaries.
- Mark Fowler (Chattanooga) He attended the STVR forum two weeks ago and wanted the Council to consider the rules related to proximity to schools for certain businesses. He asks that notes from the forum be added to the ordinance.
- Phillip Lane (District 4) He opposes the current legislation because it does not include large acreages. He asked the Council for a large lot exception. He feels that he and other other large lot owners are being ignored and excluded from the overlay.
- **Billy Reynolds (District 9)** He does not want Glenwood excluded from the STVR boundaries. He argued that only a few Glenwood residents opposed this ordinance. He asked the Council to amend the ordinance by putting Glenwood in the STVR boundaries.

**Councilman Henderson moved** to approve the original draft from June 13, 2017. He was seconded by Councilwoman Berz. Councilman Gilbert confirmed that District 5 is out of the overlay. Mr. Bridger confirmed that District 5 is not in the overlay.

**Councilman Ledford moved** to amend Section 11-472 to state the following: "Short-term vacation rentals shall only be located within the Short-Term Vacation Rental District, except for lots with an area that is equal to or greater than 10 acres." He was seconded by Councilwoman Coonrod. Councilman Ledford explained how this amendment is an answer to some of the questions regarding proximity. Upon no further questions, the motion failed upon roll call vote as follows:

**Councilwoman Coonrod moved** to amend to add Glenwood into the overlay. She was seconded by Councilman Ledford. Vice-Chairman Smith clarified that she was wanting to include the entire area of Glenwood into the map. Councilwoman Coonrod confirmed that. Councilwoman Berz asked for clarification that Councilwoman Coonrod wanted to now include the one tract in Glenwood that originally excluded from the overlay. Councilwoman Coonrod confirmed that. Upon no further discussion, the motion failed upon roll call vote as follows:

A discussion ensued, with Councilman Henderson indicating that he has did not hear arguments to amend during the Council's 3:00 p.m. committee meeting. Councilman Henderson asked Blythe Bailey, Transportation Administrator, if there would be any problem with Transportation if it was amended until September. Mr. Bailey explained the usual amount of time is 30 days, but did not foresee a problem with an extension. Councilman Byrd explained his amendment due to the property owner being ready to move to a new building by September 1. Councilman Smith requested to hear from the owner.

• The committee met today for an introduction to the small cell ordinance. The ordinance will come before the Council for first reading on July 11.

# RECOGNITION OF PERSONS WISHING TO ADDRESS COUNCIL (Non-Agenda Items)

Attorney Hinton read the rules of procedure for persons wishing to address the Council on nonagenda items. After which, Vice-Chairman Smith recognized the following persons:

- Monty Bell (Chattanooga) He asked the Council to consider his open letter from April submitted to the Council that, in part, referred to the need for a suitable police chief. He recommended Assistant Chief McPherson as a person of great character for the city's police chief. He also asked Councilwoman Coonrod to locate a student named Rashayma Williams. He asked her assistance in locating Ms. Williams and helping to secure an automobile for Ms. Williams prior to going to college.
- Dennis Clark (Chattanooga) He informed the Council that his brother was murdered in Avondale at a night club, and that today would have been his 29<sup>th</sup> birthday. His brother was the 21<sup>st</sup> homicide in the city in 2016. He asked the Council to increase funding for violence prevention programs. He also requested a 30-second moment of silence to remember victims and their families.
  - Councilwoman Coonrod thanked Mr. Clark for sharing his story about his brother and spoke on losing her fiancée to violence at a gas station. She called for an end to violence "by any means necessary" in District 9.
  - Mr. Clark discussed how violence in the community is a public health issue. He challenged the Council to reassess funding to see how it impacts the community.

- Cynthia Stanley-Cash (President, North Brainerd Neighborhood Association) –She asked the City Attorney to clarify the 30-day limit for non-agenda speakers. She also thanked Councilman Gilbert for his standing up for District 5 and making it clear how the district stood on short-term vacation rentals.
- James Gilliam (Chattanooga) He informed the Council of going to the Eastdale YFD Center and finding children without adult supervision. He asked the city to hire more adults for the center. He also asked the Council to help him with cleaning up neighborhoods. He encouraged the Council to consider Assistant Chief McPherson for police chief because he understands crime and is respected in the community.
  - Councilwoman Coonrod asked Mr. Gilliam to clarify about his cleanup services. She also asked YFD Administrator, Lurone Jennings, about how many staff they have at Eastdale. Mr. Jennings informed the Council of the ratio of students to staff persons, but offered to check on the incident that Mr. Gilliam presented.
